

# CBS Golf Broadcast Team for the 2011 John Deere Classic



**BILL MACATEE**  
*18TH HOLE TOWER*

Bill Macatee joined CBS Sports in 1995. He recently described the action at the 14th hole at the Masters for the 12th straight year after having served as CBS

Sports' studio host at the Masters® (1996-99). Macatee hosted the opening rounds of the Masters for almost 20 years and every Ryder Cup from 1991-2006 while serving as anchor for USA Network's coverage of the PGA TOUR (1990-2006). He has handled NFL play-by-play at the network for more than a decade.

Macatee also continues to play a major role as an announcer not only for CBS Sports' golf coverage, including the Masters and PGA Championship, but also for the U.S. Open Tennis Championships and a variety of CBS SPORTS SPECTACULAR events. Macatee has shown his versatility by serving as the weekend daytime co-host of the 1998 Olympic Winter Games on CBS and play-by-play announcer for college basketball including the NCAA Tournament and the Division II National Championship game. He also is the only broadcaster in the industry who currently announces two of the most prestigious events in sports, the Masters and Wimbledon.



**IAN BAKER-FINCH**

Ian Baker-Finch, winner of 16 tournaments worldwide, including the 1991 British Open, joined CBS Sports as an analyst for the Network's golf coverage in 2007. Baker-Finch began

his professional golfing career on the Australasian Tour in 1979, and after more than a decade of successful competition around the world, he won the 1991 British Open at Royal Birkdale. From 1983-93 Baker-Finch won 16 titles worldwide, including tournaments on all four major Tours. He represented Australia in the 1985 World Cup, four World Tours Championships from 1985-91 and the Dunhill Cup in 1989 and 1992. He also served as Peter Thomson's Vice Captain for the International Presidents Cup Team in 1996, as well as Gary Player's Assistant Captain for the 2003, 2005 and 2007 International Presidents Cup Team. Having worked for more than a decade as a golf analyst for all the major tours throughout the world, Baker-Finch also joined TNT as an analyst for its golf coverage in 2008. He began competing on the Champions Tour in 2011, shortly after his 50th birthday.



**PETER OOSTERHUIS**

Peter Oosterhuis joined the CBS Sports golf announce team full-time in 1998 after having served as an analyst for the network's coverage of four tournaments, including the Masters and

PGA Championship, in 1997. He also serves as a contributing analyst for The Golf Channel's Pre-and Post-Game Shows as well as analyst for select fall series events, Champions Tour and the PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament. As a player, Oosterhuis competed on the PGA TOUR from 1975 to 1986. Before that, he played worldwide on the European Tour, amassing more than 20 victories. He was runner-up in the British Open in 1974 and 1982 and led the European Tour Order of Merit for four consecutive years (1971-74), a record that stood until broken by Colin Montgomerie in 1997. Oosterhuis played on six European Ryder Cup teams from 1971 to 1981. He is co-holder of the record for most wins in singles with Nick Faldo, Arnold Palmer, Billy Casper, Sam Snead and Lee Trevino (six).



**DAVID FEHERTY**  
*ON COURSE*

One of the more charismatic players in golf, Feherty joined CBS Sports full time in 1997 after having served as analyst for the Network's coverage

of several events in 1996, including the PGA Championship, President's Cup and Doral-Ryder Open. Born and raised in Bangor, Northern Ireland, Feherty has represented Ireland several times, captaining them to victory in the 1990 Alfred Dunhill Cup. He also played for Europe in the 1991 Ryder Cup. Once a regular on the European TOUR, Feherty's victories included: the ICI International, Italian Open, Scottish Open, South Africa PGA, BMW Open, Cannes Open, Bell's Cup and Madrid Open. He retired from both the European TOUR and the PGA TOUR in 1997. Feherty is the author of The New York Times bestsellers, A Nasty Bit of Rough, Somewhere in Ireland A Village is Missing an Idiot and David Feherty's Totally Subjective History of the Ryder Cup. His "Sidespin" column is one of the more popular features in Golf Magazine.



# CBS Sports World Class Golf Coverage



**LANCE BARROW**  
*COORDINATING PRODUCER/  
PRODUCER, GOLF, NFL*

Lance Barrow assumed the position of coordinating producer, CBS Sports golf, in January 1997. In 2011, Barrow joined the

John Deere Classic volunteer executive board of directors. Barrow produced the majority of CBS's golf coverage in 1996 and all of it since 1997. He worked his first Masters in 1977 as a spotter for Pat Summerall. Barrow accepted the Emmy Award for CBS Sports' coverage of the 2004 Masters®. He was promoted to Coordinating Producer of THE NFL ON CBS and lead game producer in May 2004 with the No. 1 NFL announce team of Jim Nantz and Phil Simms. In 2010, he served as coordinating producer and lead game producer for Super Bowl XLIV, which was watched by 106.5 million viewers making it the most-watched program in television history at the time. Barrow served in the same capacity for the first time when CBS Sports broadcast Super Bowl XLI in 2007. Before that he was replay director for CBS Sports' coverage of Super Bowl XXXV and Super Bowl XXXVIII. Barrow, a 11-time Emmy Award winner, joined CBS Sports in May 1975 as

a spotter/researcher and has served in virtually every capacity of CBS Sports' golf production. Barrow produced CBS Sports' coverage of ski jumping and nordic combined at the 1994 Olympic Winter Games and was the associate director of the primetime broadcasts at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games. He also has served as producer for coverage of NCAA basketball, college football and auto racing. Barrow produced coverage of the 1998 Daytona 500 for which he received an Emmy nomination. As associate producer, his credits include the Masters and PGA Championship; NCAA men's Final Four; Daytona 500; the U.S. Open Tennis Championships; THE NFL TODAY and six Super Bowls. Barrow has earned Emmy Awards for his work on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship, the Daytona 500 and the NFL. He was the recipient of the first Gene Sarazen Spirit Award presented by the Professional Caddie Association in 2007. Barrow was honored by his alma mater, Abilene Christian University, with the naming of the "Lance Barrow Football Film/Editing Classroom" inside ACU's Teague Special Events Center. And in 2008 he was honored as ACU's Outstanding Alumnus of the Year. Barrow attended Abilene Christian University in Texas, where he played football and baseball. He earned a communications degree in 1978. Born February 2, 1955, in Fort Worth, Texas, Barrow lives in Colleyville, Texas.

**BOB MATINA DIRECTOR**

Bob Matina, a six-time Emmy Award-winner, has covered the Masters® as associate director, late night director and director since 1987. He also has directed the PGA Championship since 1991. Bob Matina serves as the director of THE NFL TODAY. He joined CBS Sports in 1981 and directed THE NFL ON CBS from 1985 to 1993. Matina served as director of THE SUPER BOWL TODAY studio show for Super Bowl XXXV, XXXVIII, XLI and XLIV (2001, 2004, 2007, 2010). He served as coordinating director of CBS Sports' coverage of the 1992, 1994 and 1998 Olympic Winter Games, and also directed the Network's primetime coverage in 1994 and 1998, and weekend daytime broadcasts in 1992. Matina's other directing assignments have included THE ROAD TO THE FINAL FOUR, the U.S. Open Tennis Championships, golf and college basketball broadcasts, as well as several winter sports competitions. He was the producer of the Emmy Award-winning Lillehammer: An Olympic Diary in 1995.

**DAVID WINNER PRODUCER**

David Winner has been part of CBS Sports' golf production team since 1984. He has served as producer for the U.S. Open Tennis Championships since 1981, as well as the Network's college basketball regular-season and NCAA Tournament studio shows. As the Network's lead producer for figure skating, Winner's credits include the 1994 and 1998 Olympic Winter Games, as well as several additional skating specials. He also produced the primetime broadcasts and Opening Ceremony at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games. As senior producer, CBS Sports (1989-91), Winner was responsible for the overall editorial content of the Network's wrap-around programs. He joined CBS in 1980 and has won three Emmy Awards as a producer of NFL broadcasts, one for his role in the 1990 NCAA Tournament and one for his role in the 2004 Masters®. Winner is a 1972 graduate of Washington University in St. Louis.
